30 31 32 33 34 35	COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF MARGATE, FLORIDA: <u>SECTION 1:</u> That Article IV. Boards, Committees, Etc., is hereby amended by adding Section 2-124 - 2-135 to read as follows:

37 38 20	(A)This chapter shall be known and cited as the "public art program."
 39 40 41 42 43 44 45 46 47 48 	(B) It is the intent and purpose of this chapter to foster creative placemaking within the City's built environment and further the City's commitment to use the aesthetic, historical, cultural, and economic enrichment of the arts as a way to support the arts in the community and continue to improve the quality of life for all citizens and visitors through the promotion, preservation and protection of the arts.

(C) The goals of the program should be to promote public art, to 1 2 provide and find a forum for public art, to seek grant and 3 funding opportunities for public art, to foster partnerships, 4 to develop and implement the public art program, and to 5 advocate for public art. 6 7 8 Section 2-125 Definitions. 9 For the purposes of this section, the following words and 10 phrases shall have the following meanings: 11 12 Artist or professional artist: A practitioner in the visual 13 arts, generally recognized by critics and peers as a 14 professional of serious intent and ability. Indications of 15 a person's status as a professional artist include, but are not limited to, income realized through the sole commission 16 of artwork, frequent or consistent art exhibitions, 17 placement of artwork in public institutions or museums, 18 19 receipt of honors and awards, and training in the arts. 20 21 Art, artwork or works of art: Tangible creations by artists 22 exhibiting the highest quality of skill and aesthetic 23 principles and includes all forms of the visual arts conceived in any medium, material, or combination thereof, 24 25 including, but not limited to, painting, sculptures, 26 engravings, carvings, frescos, stained glass, mosaics, 27 mobiles, tapestries, murals, photographs, video 28 projections, digital images, bas-relief, high relief, 29 fountains, kinetics, collages, drawings, monuments erected 30 to commemorate a person or an event, functional furnishings, such as artist designed seating and pavers, 31 32 architectural elements designed by an artist, and artist 33 designed landforms or landscape elements. 23 24 25 26 27	(A) Establishment, number of members, appointment. There is established the Arts in Public Places Committee. The committee shall be an advisory committee consisting of seven (7) members, all shall be appointed by the City Commission.					
28 29 30 31	(B) Terms. The members shall serve without compensation and shall be appointed to terms of three (3) years, unless otherwise noted in this article.

Committee members shall be individuals who live or work in the city and who by career choice, personal interest, or civic participation have demonstrated an interest in creating or supporting art. No one profession or background trait shall dominate the membership at any one time. The interests or careers may include, but shall not be limited to the following: visual artists, arts educators, arts administrators, gallery owners, museum professionals, curators, designers, fundraising professionals, members of professional arts organizations, developers, architects, landscape architects, urban planners, engineers, and persons who regularly acquire or sponsor art.

If any member of the Arts in Public 5 Places Committee shall find that his private or personal 6 interests are involved in the matter coming before the 7 committee, he shall disqualify himself from all participation 8 in that matter. No member of the Arts in Public Places 9 Committee shall have his or her work of art considered or approved by the Arts in Public Places Committee during their 10 term of service on the committee or for one 11 (1) year 12 thereafter. 13 14 Section 2-129 Artwork and artist selection criteria. 15 In addition to the below criteria, the art and artist selection criteria shall be in compliance with the Arts in 16 17 Public Places Committee master plan. 18 19 Artwork selection. The following criteria, at minimum, shall be 20 considered by the Arts in Public Places Committee in the 21 selection of artwork: 22 23 (A) Appropriateness of the artwork to the site and site 24 environmental conditions; 25 26 (B) Maximum visual accessibility to pedestrian or vehicular 27 traffic, as set forth in the public art program 28 guidelines; 29 30 (C)Quality of the artwork; 31 32 (D) Maintenance requirements; 33 34 (E)Whether the artwork too closely resembles a business logo or sign and should, therefore, be rejected; and 35 36 37 (F)Any other criteria set forth in the public art program 38 quidelines, as amended from time to time. 39 40 Artist selection. The following criteria, at minimum, shall be 41 considered by the Arts in Public Places Committee in the 42 selection of an artist: 43 44 (A) Ability of the artist to complete the project within a specified schedule and budget; 45 5 CODING: Words in struck through type are deletions from existing text; Words in underscored type are additions.

1 2 (B)Exhibition and sales history of the artist, as well as 3 works of art in public collections and previous public 4 art purchases or commissions; and 5 6 (C)Any other criteria set forth in the public art program 7 quidelines, as amended from time to time. 8 9 Section 2-130 Public art funding and special account. 10 Public art funding. All nonresidential and nonresidential components of mixed-11 12 use development and redevelopment projects that exceed two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.00) in vertical construction 13 14 participate in the public art program. costs shall When 15 construction is phased, the project's aggregate vertical construction cost shall be added together to determine whether 16 17 the two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000.00) threshold is 18 reached. 19 20 (A) One percent of all qualifying projects shall be 21 dedicated to the design, installation, and maintenance 22 of public art. The one percent allocation shall be 23 transferred to a separate account for use in installing 24 public art. 25 26 (B)All funds derived from the process of subsection (A) 27 above shall be pooled together for the express purpose 28 of providing for art in public places for the benefit of 29 the public at large. The revenue derived from a particular development or redevelopment project may be 30 used for public art associated with the project or may 31 32 also be used for other public art. 33 34 (C) The provisions of subsection (A) shall not apply to the 35 following circumstances: 36 37 (a) The projected cost of the development or 38 redevelopment project is less than two hundred 39 thousand dollars (\$200,000.00); 40 41 (b) The cost of the project is funded in whole part or 42 by state or federal funds; 43 44 (c) The costs attributed to below-grade improvements 45 such as sanitary sewer and stormwater drainage, as 6 CODING: Words in struck through type are deletions from existing text; Words in underscored type are

1 well as project costs incurred in coming into 2 compliance with state and federal environmental 3 regulations; or 4 5 (d)Costs for projects intended to rehabilitate or 6 extend the useful life of an existing improvement 7 substantially without changing the overall 8 character of its appearance. 9 10 (D) The owner shall provide documentation to the City that 11 the art fee has been deposited into the public art account prior to the issuance of a building permit. 12 13 14 (E)Prior to placement on the development site, if said 15 artwork is part of the proposed project, the artwork 16 must be approved by the Arts in Public Places Committee 17 and conform to adopted public art guidelines. 18 19 (a) The owner shall be given up to six (6) months after 20 issuance of the building permit to obtain approval 21 of the proposed artwork from the Arts in Public 22 Places Committee, unless the committee grants an 23 extension as determined in their sole discretion. 24 25 (b) The owner shall install artwork prior to the 26 issuance of a certificate of occupancy, as approved 27 by the Arts in Public Places Committee, unless the 28 committee grants an extension as determined in their sole discretion. 29 30 31 Special account. 32 There is hereby created a public art fund administered by 33 the Arts in Public Places Committee which shall consist of all 34 contributions received from fees for development art and redevelopment 35 greater than two hundred thousand dollars 36 (\$200,000.00), cash grants and donations to the city for public 37 art projects from governmental or private resources, and all 38 other funds allocated by the city through the budgetary process for the provision of public art. 39 40 41 (A) The public art fund shall be used solely for expenses 42 selection, associated with the commissioning, public 43 acquisitions, transportation, maintenance, 44 education, promotion, administration, removal and insurance of the works of art or in relation thereto. 45 46 7 CODING: Words in struck through type are deletions from existing text; Words in underscored type are additions.

Section 2-131 Fundraising.

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2 The Arts in Public Places Committee shall undertake 3 fundraising efforts to secure the financial support of 4 individuals, businesses, governmental grants for the arts, and 5 from nonprofit organizations support which directly or 6 indirectly fund the arts. The funds so secured may be used for 7 specific objects of public art, for the enhancement of specific site locations for public art, or for the general purpose of 8 9 public art in compliance with the public art master plan. 10 11 Section 2-132 Ownership of artwork. 12 Unless otherwise expressly agreed to in writing by the 13 City, ownership of all art acquired through expending funds in 14 the public art fund shall be vested in the City, which shall 15 obtain title to each work of art. 16 17 Section 2-133 Public art program guidelines. 18 The Arts in Public Places Committee shall prepare, and from time to time, revise public art guidelines and make the same 19 20 available to the public, which shall provide guidance for: 21 22 (A) Program organization; 23 24 (B)Organizational governance and staffing responsibilities; 25 26 (C) Procedures for project planning; 27 28 (D) Artist selection; 29 30 (E) Artwork selection criteria; 31 32 (F) Art placement criteria; 33 34 (G) Donations; 35 36 (H) Loans and memorials; 37 38 (I)Collection management; 39 40 (J) Administration of the public art fund. 41 42 Section 2-134 Public art master plan. 8

1 All placements and expenditures for public art shall comply 2 with the public art master plan, as approved by the City Commission and from time to time amended. The plan shall be 3 4 established and implemented to bring art to the people of the City of Margate and to those visiting the city in a manner that 5 6 makes the art readily visible to the public at large. For 7 purposes of this division, art is public when it is situated upon public property or on private property with rights of 8 9 access or viewing, or both, afforded to the city on behalf of 10 the public at large.

Section 2-135 Recommendation to the City Commission.

When the Arts in Public Places Committee approves a specific object of public art for placement, the committee shall make a recommendation to the City Commission to that effect and provide a visual representation of the art and a description of how it complies with the master art plan. The City Commission shall have final approval on the placement of public art.

In addition, Image Committee staff recommendation shall be required for those projects specified in the public art master plan needing coordination with said committee before seeking final approval with the City Commission.

<u>SECTION 3</u>: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are, and the same is, here by repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION 4: If any section, clause or phrase of this ordinance is held to be invalid or unconstitutional by a court of competent jurisdiction, then said holding shall in no way affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance.

SECTION 5: It is the intention of the City Commission that the provisions of this ordinance shall become and be made a part of the City of Margate Code, and that the sections of this ordinance may be renumbered or re-lettered and the word "ordinance" may be changed to "section", "article" or such other appropriate word or phrase in order to accomplish such intentions.

SECTION 6: This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon adoption at its second reading.
