Dear Taxpayer:

This is in response to your request of June 17, 2014, regarding the tax-exempt status of BROWARD PARTNERSHIP FOR THE HOMELESS INC .

Our records indicate that a determination letter was issued in JUNE 1998, granting this organization exemption from Federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Our records also indicate this organization is not a private foundation within the meaning of section 509(a) of the Code because it is described in section(s) 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(A)(v).

Our records indicate that in December 1938, the American National Red Cross was held to be exempt from Federal income tax under section 101(6) of the Internal Revenue Act of 1938, which now corresponds to section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. In a subsequent determination, the American Red Cross was classified as a publicly supported organization described in sections 509(a)(1) and 170(b)(1)(a)(vi) of the Code.

Even though the American National Red Cross was issued an individual ruling, this ruling covers its chapters, branches, and auxiliaries.



Specifically, section 6033(j) of the Code provides that failure to file an annual information return for three consecutive years results in revocation of tax-exempt status as of the filing due date of the third return for organizations required to file. 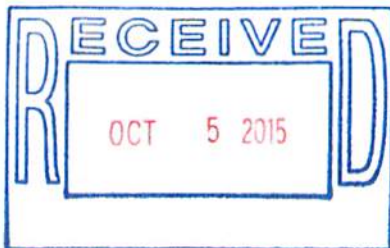

About the Broward Partnership

The Broward Partnership built and operates the Broward County Central Homeless Assistance Center on the Huizenga Campus.

Completed and opened in 1999, the 57,000 square foot, 230-bed short term residential shelter was funded almost entirely with private donations. The Broward Partnership provides short-term housing and solution-focused services to individuals and families. The term "emergency" means that the average stay is 60 days. Since it's opening, the Partnership has assisted more than 23,400 individuals.

The Broward Partnership believes that an individual's stay at the Center, although time limited, represents a unique (and perhaps only) opportunity to stabilize, engage and acquire the personal tools necessary to break the cycle of homelessness. More than an emergency shelter, the Center provides a safe and nurturing environment designed to highlight alternatives to living on the street and provide each resident with the means to reacquire health, housing, and a sustaining income.



List of Services:

Primary medical and dental care. Mental health diagnosis and treatment, and psychiatric services. Substance abuse education, prevention, intervention and treatment; as well as 12-Step programs. Access to child care, parenting education, support groups and family therapy;

Educational services, including GED classes, vocational assessment, job readiness, job training and placement services. Life skills classes and computer classes.

The first floor of the facility contains a family dorm that accommodates up to 30 women and their children, the medical and dental clinics, case management offices, the workforce development center and computer lab, the child care center, a children's learning center, classrooms, a library, a gym, a hair salon, a clothing center and laundry facilities.



The second story accommodates the behavioral health offices, and the living arrangements consisting of two men's dormitories that house a total of 120 men, one women's dormitory for 40 women, and a modular family wing for ten families or 40 family members. Construction was recently completed at the Center that added an additional thirty beds for women and women with families. In addition to the 30 new beds, with the generous support of the **Realtor Association of Greater Fort Lauderdale Charitable Foundation**, we have renovated the children's playground with new ADA compliant, age appropriate equipment and synthetic turf.

Program participants eat in a central dining room that serves three meals prepared in the Center's commercial kitchen. The kitchen also serves as a vocational training facility for residents interested in careers in food service.

A landscaped central outdoor courtyard provides residents a place to read, reflect and speak with other residents. A butterfly garden, built by the employees of **JM Family Enterprises**, provides additional space for our residents to reflect on the challenges ahead. Each resident, as part of their program provides community service time while at the Center, many choose to assist in the maintenance of the grounds and helping with cleaning in the kitchen.

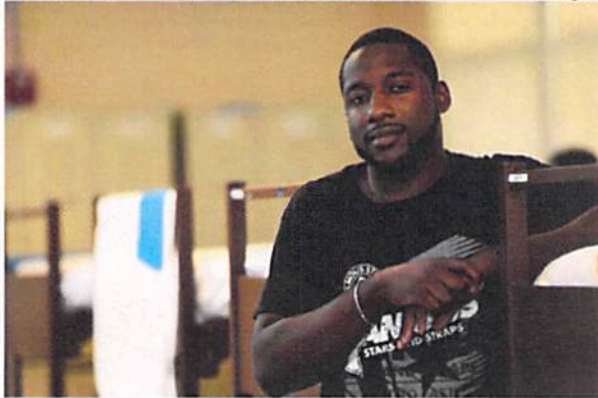
Frequently Asked Questions

What is the mission of Broward Partnership?

Broward Partnership is committed to reducing homelessness by promoting independence and self worth through advocacy, housing and comprehensive services. It operates the 230-bed Broward County Central Homeless Assistance Center/Huizenga Campus in Fort Lauderdale, Florida which provides short term housing and a solution-focused service program for men, women and children.

How large is the homeless population in Broward County?

Data from Broward County states that on any given night there are almost 200 families each month that are homeless and on the community's waiting list for shelter. In addition, it is estimated that there are 2,400 homeless children attending Broward County Schools.



Who are the homeless people at the Central Homeless Assistance Center?

Approximately 77% of the population is male.

86% of the population falls between the ages of 18 and 61.

46% are White, 44% Black, 10% Hispanic, with Native American, Asian, Haitian, and other making up the balance.

96% of the population is single.

How did they become homeless?

The major causes of homelessness are loss of employment and a lack of affordable housing. In addition, health and behavioral problems, family problems and eviction play a large role in creating homelessness.

How many homeless people has the Broward Partnership helped?

Since February 1, 1999, more than 23,400 persons experiencing homelessness in Broward County have received assistance the Broward Partnership.



What services does the Broward Partnership provide?

The Broward Partnership uses an innovative model of care that has been recognized to be among the most effective in the country. The organization delivers specialized services to ensure that homeless men, women and children receive clean and safe temporary housing, nutritious meals, child care, medical care, dental care, mental health and substance abuse treatment, counseling, vocational training and employment services needed to establish self sufficiency.

What happens when a person completes their 60 days in residence?

They go on to the next step in their planned program to live independently. Many participate in our "aftercare" program that is designed to assist them maintain housing and independence.

Can people come back again?

In special circumstances, former program participants are allowed to return to the center if they experience homelessness again. Returning participants are required to participate in specialized programs designed to reinforce the skills needed to regain their independence. Participants who were discharged from the Center for acts of violence, threatened violence or sale of any type of drug are not permitted to return.

How is the Broward Partnership funded?

Approxiamtely 52% of our revenue comes from government grants and contracts. The remainder comes from private corporations, charitable foundations, special events and individuals. In-kind donations of food, clothing, furniture and services also helps offset many expenses that we would otherwise incur.

What can I do to help?

There are many ways to contribute. The Broward Partnership has numerous programs and fundraising activities in which you can participate. The agency also accepts in-kind gifts of goods and services and offers a community volunteer program for those who wish to have a hands-on experience.
